CHAIR LETTER

Camai...Hello,

It is time for another newsletter from the Native Village of Afognak (NVA)! I write this with the hope that the updates and information shared here are meaningful to you, the tribal members.

This past October, I was able to attend the Alaska Federation of Natives (AFN) Convention in person after a couple of years off due to COVID-19. I truly enjoyed watching people greet each other with big smiles, and hugs. The happiness and joy of reconnecting was very evident. The theme of this year's AFN convention was Celebrating Our Unity. I feel fortunate to realize that I take the concept of unity among the Kodiak Native people for granted. I believe I can safely say that the Native Village of Afognak Council and Staff are proud and appreciative to work cooperatively with our Alaska Native village corporation, the Afognak Native Corporation; our Alaska Native regional corporation, Koniag, Incorporated; our Alaska Native regional nonprofit corporation, Kodiak Area Native Association (KANA); and various other Alaska Native organizations of Kodiak Island for the betterment of the Alaska Native people originating from and/or living in the Kodiak area. Leaders from each of these organizations meet regularly to share successes and challenges, and to plan for working together to achieve advocacy on behalf of our people. I appreciate the collaboration and support shared among these Native organizations. Throughout the year, the NVA Council has been meeting regularly with full agendas and good discussions pertaining to the ongoing business of the tribe. In the past few months, Council and staff have been reviewing governance and internal policies with the goal of better serving our tribal members and their families. The Council also continues to work on tribal member assistance programs and other decisions regarding the one-time benefit of receiving funding from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). We want to spend these funds in a way that is responsible and meaningful for the present and future of our tribal organization and its members. In the office, Staff have been working diligently to ensure that all financial transactions are in order and properly accounted for while working with partners to accomplish the annual financial audit. Staff are also busy planning the annual Dig Afognak fundraising dinner and auction, and the 2023 Dig Afognak camp schedule. The boutique of Alutiiq Merchandise is being updated with new designs and inventory; and the hydroponic farming operations, Mal'uk Farms, is regularly providing fresh greens to local elders as well as being expanded with new equipment and growing space. It is our hope that Mal'uk farms will continue to grow and provide local food security and revenue for the tribe. In closing, I hope that your holidays were exactly as you wished, whether merry and festive or calm and peaceful. I also wish you all the best in the new

HYDROPONICS UPDATE! MAL'UK FARMS

Mal'uk Farms is a collaboration between Native Village of Afognak (NVA) and Tangirnaq Native Village (TNV) formerly known as Woody Island Tribal, to provide fresh produce to our Elders and will be offering produce to all Tribal members soon!

NVA & TNV obtained two sunny pro-hydroponic cabinets through an Administration for Native American's grant administered by the Kodiak Archipelago Leadership Institute (KALI) two years ago. Each cabinet can grow up to 115 heads of lettuce every 45-55 days! This past summer we received our containerized growing unit. This container has been such a benefit for us as its growing capacity is up to 1800 heads of lettuce! We are currently working on getting our Food Hub up and running so Tribal members can see what's available online, purchase, and pick-up. If any members are interested in sampling our fresh greens, please feel free to stop by the office. Currently, we are delivering to our local Elders on a weekly and bi-weekly basis. If we happen to miss you, please feel free to stop by our office to pick-up your fresh greens. If you're unable to stop in, give us a call so we can set up a day and time to get your produce to you. To better serve you, we need all Tribal members updated contact information and the best way to contact you whether it be call, text, or e-mail. You can update your information by calling the office during regular business hours. Additionally, we are waiting for the arrival of our packing unit. This unit will support a more efficient process of harvesting and delivering the produce. Currently, our main obstacle is storage capacity, and we are looking into procuring a 6x6x8 outdoor walk-in cooler to store the fresh produce. This week, we harvested over 300 heads of lettuce in our containerized growing system and 300 additional heads are on track to be harvested in two weeks. We would love to hear your feedback on our product and how we can better serve you in the future.



*Mulch-the branches and needles provide moisture and insulation during the Winter months

*Compost-the branches make a great base (cut in to smaller pieces) but remove the needles, they can slow down the disintegration process

*Crafts-the trunk can be cut in to thin slices and used as rustic coasters, the needles can be simmered as potpourri

Denali Commission Program Grant was applied for in the amount of \$117,122.00. NVA was awarded \$50,000 to support the hiring of a consultant to conduct a feasibility study. financial assessment, and development of a solid business plan for Mal'uk Farms.

Capital Projects Fund was applied for in the amount of \$167,500. If awarded, funds will be used to make necessary upgrades to our current technology and facility improvements to support education, employment, health, and wellness.

This is a one-time assistance program designed for enrolled Tribal members 18 and older to receive up to \$500 to be used toward rent or mortgage payments. If you have already applied for the Round 2 assistance, you are not eligible to re-apply at this time. Applications will be accepted until funds are expended.
